TRUSTEES' REPORT For the year ended 31 December 2012

The trustees present their report and the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2012. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Deed of Trust and the recommendations of the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) updated in 2008 and comply with applicable law.

Reference and Administrative Details

Reference and administrative details are shown on page 1 of the financial statements.

Constitution and Objects of the Trust

The J Paul Getty Jr General Charitable Trust ("the Trust") was established by a Deed of Trust dated 19 June 1985. Under the terms of the Deed of Trust the trustees have broad powers to apply both income and capital for general charitable purposes. There have been no changes in the objects since the last annual report. The trustees continue to work towards an orderly closure of the Trust within the next three years, and the Trust was closed to unsolicited applications on 18 January 2013.

It continues to be the policy of the trustees to support well-managed projects throughout the United Kingdom in the fields of social welfare and the arts. The trustees have a particular interest in projects that help disadvantaged people reach their potential, and aim to effect long-term change where help is not otherwise readily available from the public or private purse. In addition, the Trust supports the arts and conservation of the natural and built environment.

Appointment and Election of Trustees and Trustee Induction and Training

The management of the Trust and the appointment of trustees are the responsibility of the trustees. Care is taken to ensure an appropriate mix of skills and knowledge. The Trust Deed provides for a minimum of four trustees. None of the four serving trustees anticipates standing down before the Trust closes, but if new trustees were required they would be identified and appointed by the remaining trustees. New trustees receive a copy of the constitution and a full briefing on the Trust's objectives and operations. Further trustee training is undertaken when considered appropriate and all serving trustees aim to visit at least one funded or applicant project during the year – the actual number visited by trustees is usually much higher. The present trustees have all served as trustees for a number of years.

All trustees give of their time freely and no trustee remuneration was paid in the year. A number of grants were made to organisations with which the trustees or director have some connection, for instance as trustee of that charity. These are considered by the trustees to be related party transactions and in each case the relevant trustee did not participate in the decision. A list of such grants is provided on page 20 of the accounts.

The day to day management of the Trust has been delegated to the director, Elizabeth Rantzen. The Trust also benefits from advice on addictions from Dr Samantha Gross.

Organisational Matters

Until 18 January 2013, the majority of initial applications was made online by charities seeking funding; all trustees received summaries of all applications for review each month. Potential candidates for shortlisting might be asked for further details about finances, governance and

intentions. Scrutiny of the responses was usually followed by discussions in person or by telephone. Recommended projects were considered by the trustees at their quarterly meetings.

During the year the trustees met five times. In addition there was one meeting of the investment committee which is comprised of Christopher Purvis, Elizabeth Rantzen and Michael Robarts, an investment management consultant.

Risk Management

The trustees regularly review the risks facing the Trust. Financial and legal risks, including financial fraud, governance risks, reputation risks and reliance on key personnel are all considered and mitigating actions agreed where necessary.

Review of Grant Making

The Trust received 1,436 applications in 2012 (1,155 in 2011) and new grant commitments totalling £7,601,492 were made during the year (£11,703,960 in 2011). 1,190 applications were for "main grants", ie. exceeding £5,000. In 2012 £7,021,879 was committed in 163 main grants (£11,388,400 in 2011), with an average grant size of just over £43,000 (2011 just under £80,000), and £409,613 was committed in grants of £5,000 or less.

Only three grants of more than £100,000 were made in 2012. The Centre for Mental Health was awarded £240,000 for a three-year programme to adapt an evidence-based approach to helping people with mental health problems get into a real job on release from prison. The London Symphony Orchestra was awarded £120,000 for its choral development programme, embracing and taking forward all the strands of its choral work, and the Royal Opera House was awarded £110,000 to give hundreds of children from disadvantaged background in Thurrock their first taste of ballet and enabling those demonstrating real potential to extend their involvement to a high level.

The funding priorities remained unchanged, with social welfare charities receiving 58% of the value of main grants awarded, and 41% being directed towards heritage and the arts (with 1% to other categories). The main focus of the social welfare programme was on rehabilitation of offenders (20%), homelessness (11%) and improving life chances for disadvantaged young people (10%).

Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the directions contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's aims and objectives and in planning future activities and setting the grant-making policy.

Financial Review

Further to the decision to wind down the Trust, the trustees continued to withdraw funds from the invested portfolio and to build up the cash position. As at 31 December 2012 the value of longer term investments was £15,430,499 and £11,770,875 was held in a liquidity fund managed by BlackRock.

Of the longer term investments, £10,236,380 was held in an absolute return fund managed by Barings and £5,194,119 in four funds managed by BlackRock, Charishare, Gobal Equity, International Equity Fund and Charinco.

The figure shown in the accounts for the cost of managing the investment portfolio is £(22,349),

however this figure does not include the fees that are embedded within the funds held within the portfolio and is, therefore, not a true reflection of the investment management costs.

Reserves Policy

It is the policy of the trustees at all times to maintain sufficient reserves in cash or cash funds to meet all future commitments in full, whilst maintaining a level of invested funds capable of generating a significant return for onward donation. The trustees monitor the level of reserves at each meeting. All funds held are unrestricted.

Future Plans

After the large number of applications received before 18 January 2013 has been considered, the trustees will develop a plan for the disbursement of the final funds.

During the coming year further sales of investments will be made.

Auditor

Nexia Smith & Williamson continued as the Trust's auditor during 2012 and have expressed their willingness to continue in this role.

Trustees' Responsibilities Statement

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable regulations). Under that law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period.

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the Deed of Trust. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 2012

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005) updated in 2008, the Charities Act 2011 and applicable accounting standards.

1.2 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Trust and which have not been designated for other purposes.

1.3 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the Trust is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

1.4 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Costs of generating funds include investment management fees necessarily incurred in generating incoming resources from sources other than charitable activities.

The charity's grant related support costs include staff costs, rent and other related costs. Where the time spent on governance costs is negligible then no allocation has been made.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

1.5 Grants

Grants payable are charged to charitable activities in the year when the offer is made. All grants payable are to institutions.

1.6 Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The Statement of Financial Activities includes the net realised and unrealised gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals throughout the year.

From 31 December 2012, investments held in cash liquidity funds are now classified within current assets, with the comparative amounts for the previous year included within fixed asset investments.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended 31 December 2012

1.7 Cash flow

The Trust has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No.1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement.

1.8 Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate ruling on the date of the transaction.

1.9 Pensions

The Trust contributes to a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the Trust to the fund in respect of the year.

1.10 Operating leases

Operating lease rentals are charged against resources expended in the year in which they are incurred, even if the payments are not made on such a basis.

Rent receivable under operating leases is accounted for on a straight line basis over the lease term. Rental income included in the accounts is receivable under operating lease arrangements.

1.11 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised on the balance sheet as soon as a constructive obligation resulting from a past event can be reliably measured. Current liabilities represent those liabilities which are expected to be settled within the next 12 months from the balance sheet.
